Kennedy Moehrs Gardner

Kennedy Moehrs Gardner is a <u>Staff Attorney at Equity Legal Services</u> where, as part of the legal team, she represents residents of Cahokia Heights, IL in ongoing litigation to bring safe, adequate, and well-maintained stormwater and wastewater systems to their community to stop the flooding and sewage overflows they have experienced for decades. Prior to joining ELS, Kennedy worked as a Staff Attorney at the Metropolitan St. Louis Equal Housing & Opportunity Council, representing clients facing eviction and housing discrimination, seeking to keep the community stably housed and free from discrimination.

She keeps these experiences and the stories of people she has worked with, as well as her own family's stories and histories with housing injustice as guiding stars for her advocacy and policy work, with an eye toward holistic solutions.
